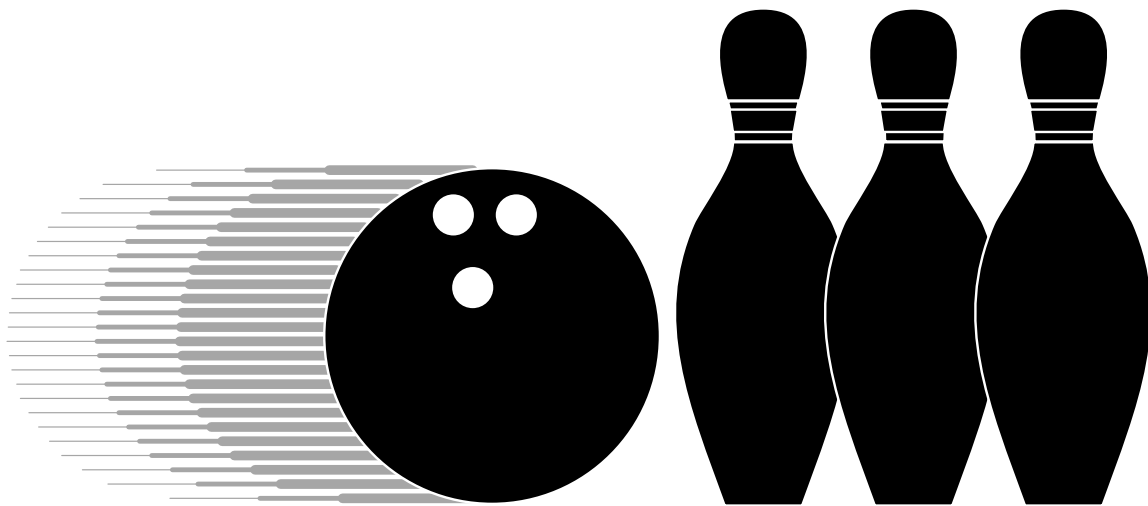

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Bowling To Begin First Season as TSSAA Sport on October 1

The first date of competition for the first season of bowling as a TSSAA sport is on Monday, October 1. The response from schools wanting to compete in bowling has been overwhelming.

Ronnie Carter, TSSAA Executive Director and NFHS President for the 2001-2002 school year, commented on the unusually high number of schools competing in a first year sport. "For a first year sport it will be an exceptionally high number. We're excited because it's a new opportunity for kids to participate in another activity. We think we will find that bowling will appeal to a lot of kids that are not involved in any other activities."

"I think we'll start with the highest number we've ever had in a sport and I think it will grow at a pace probably much other than any other sport we've ever added."

Carter pointed out that some of the reasons attributed to the high numbers of participation in bowling are that you don't have to have a facility. "This is due to the commitment of the bowling community in the state of Tennessee and all that they're doing to provide the facilities and eliminate that area of concern."

Leadership Conference

Are all schools the same? What makes your school a better place? Do you even know what the students believe or how they feel about their school? Do you know what they do on the weekend or what is said in the locker room after a coach leaves? Does your school have positive values, a good perspective, and respect; does

everyone show good sportsmanship, promote teamwork, and lead healthy lifestyles?

While every school's atmosphere may be different, the problems are all the same. Everyday we hear about the violence, the drug abuse, and the bad attitudes among students. The truth is that student athletes are no different; however, they are the student leaders. What are they teaching? The student leaders need to be taught how to lead and be given the chance to make a difference. Finally, students speak out by discussing the issues not only within their athletic teams, but also throughout their schools and communities. Students simply learn and listen to other students more.

On July 13-15, schools throughout Tennessee were given the opportunity by the NFHS and TSSAA to attend a Leadership Conference in Indianapolis, Indiana. Each school had previously been a recipient of the A. F. Bridges Award. The A.F. Bridges Award is given to 27 schools each year that have received no reported unsportsmanlike conduct during the previous school year. Of those 27, nine are selected to receive the A.F. Bridges State Award of Excellence. The awards are named the A.F. Bridges Award in honor of the TSSAA's first executive secretary.

Teacher and Coach Rocky Zazzaro of Cumberland County believes "it made winning the award that much better." While at the conference, the students were able to relate to other students from around the world. Over thirty states and three countries were represented. Debra Earnest, teacher, and student, Spencer Hand, at Loretto High School agree that "it wasn't your basic conference; it involved community service projects, fun and

games, the facilitators were more prepared than most and the atmosphere was more relaxed."

Dusty Warren from Crockett County added that the conference "was extremely worthwhile, simply because it allowed everyone to meet so many people, to actually use what was learned and it also gave steps on how to become a great leader and how to positively influence those around us."

While each Tennessee student attended different breakout sessions separately, the group later gathered to discuss a state action plan. Everyone agreed that a Tennessee leadership conference would allow students to become involved in active leadership and gain positive experiences for their school system. Ashley Prendergast, Sullivan South, expressed how "everyone seemed to leave the conference with a renewed sense of leadership and in turn, they are taking that back to their individual schools which will make Tennessee a better place!"

2001-2002 By-Law Changes

Listed below are the changes in the Bylaws for 2001-2002 that have been enacted by the Legislative Council at either the December or March meeting:

Article III, Section 13 -- The beginning date for practice has been changed from August 1 for fall sports, November 1 for winter sports, and February 15 for spring sports to the Monday of the week of August 1... the Monday of the week of November 1... the Monday of the week of February 15.

In the 2001-2002 school year, the beginning practice dates are July 30 for fall sports, October 29 for winter sports, and February 11 for spring sports.

Article III, Section 13 -- All sports must practice a minimum of three days beginning with the first official practice date before they can practice with or scrimmage another school.

Article III, Section 13 -- Change the number of games, tournaments, etc., for the following:

Volleyball -- Maximum of 45 matches, maximum of four tournaments with each tournament counting five matches.

Baseball -- Maximum of 32 games, maximum of four tournaments with each tournament counting three games.

Softball -- Maximum of 36 games, maximum of five tournament with each tournament counting four games.

Article I -- Added bowling as a sponsored sport beginning with the 2001-2002 school year.

Article I -- Added the following sections, which have been policies of the Board, but have now been placed in the Bylaws:

Section 12: Each member school has a

responsibility to monitor its athletic program and to self-report any violations of TSSAA Bylaws to the Executive Director as soon as the school is aware of possible violations. The responsibility extends to all administrators and coaches at the school. Each member school is responsible for the conduct of its administrators and coaches and for any knowledge possessed by its administrators or coaches.

Section 13: The Executive Director shall, in his discretion, determine whether information about any possible violation of the TSSAA Constitution or Bylaws is sufficiently reliable to justify further investigation. The Executive Director shall also, in his discretion, determine whether to conduct any investigation of possible violations of the Constitution or Bylaws as well as the nature and extent of any investigation that may be conducted and the procedures to be used in any such investigation. Factors to be considered by the Executive Director in making these determinations may include, but are not limited to, the workload of the TSSAA office, the seriousness of the alleged violation, the availability of staff members to assist in any investigation, the cost of investigation, the time needed to conduct an investigation, and any other factor the Executive Director may deem relevant in making these decisions.

Section 14: (a) A violation of the TSSAA Constitution or Bylaws will not result in any investigation or penalty if it is inadvertent and the school first learns of and reports the violation after the conclusion of the following year's playoffs in the sport in which the violation occurred. (b) If it is determined that a school (or any of its administrators or coaches) had knowledge of a violation or possible violation of the TSSAA Constitution or Bylaws and failed to promptly self-report it as required in Section 12, or that a delay in self-reporting occurred as a result of a failure by the school to properly monitor its athletic program as required in Section 12, the provisions of subsection (a) shall not apply. In any such case, a violation may be investigated and penalties may be implemented regardless of when the violation occurred.



It's Really About the Journey

More than once I have stated on this page that one of the great things about this business of education and athletics is that we get to start all over again every year. It makes it very conducive to having new goals, recharging batteries, etc. It would probably be a little scary to think about having the same group year after year, either in the classroom or on a playing field. I can't imagine the record of the basketball team just going on and on and on. 0-0 and a fresh group, in the total scheme of things, is one of the truly great parts of this thing we get to do every day.

As we enjoy starting over each year, it is also a good thing to remind ourselves of the things that are really important about what we do. In the bigger picture, it really is about the journey.

In a poem entitled "The Station" by Robert J. Hastings, he writes about how all of us are constantly living for the goals that we set - when I get out of college, when I get a job, when I get a new job, when I retire, etc. He builds to the point only to remind us that reaching the goal, many times, leaves us disappointed and looking for more. He then takes us to the conclusion that it really is the journey that makes it all worthwhile. The journey is the best part.

We need to remind ourselves of that part every day as we talk about how many years until retirement, changing jobs, etc.; and we need to remind the students with whom we work who are talking about things like when I graduate, when I get to college, when I get a job, etc., that the goals will all get here quick enough. Enjoy the day. One of the true joys for all of us is just enjoying the journey.

There are a lot of things that happen in our lives that remind us of this, but nothing in our lifetimes more than the events that took place on September 11, 2001. It is a day that we will all remember. The people who witnessed the

events struggle to find words to describe what they saw and the rest of us struggle to find words to describe how we feel. We struggled through the hours and days that immediately followed as to how we should respond, either individually or as a nation. And then the beauty of being involved in education and activities comes to us again.

I was reminded of conversations that I had with Bob Ottewill, Commissioner of the Colorado High School Activities Association, when Columbine occurred. He stated that the people at Columbine stated over and over again how important it became to get kids involved in their activities at the school. The athletics, band, choral music, etc., became a very critical part of their new journey and, more than anything, they just wanted to be treated the same way - just regular - as they had before by other schools, other competitors, etc.

The journey of activities speaks again. We are all involved in many different types of journeys. We who are involved in education and high school activities are truly blessed. It's not for everybody. There are standards of all types - some minimum and some tougher, but it is very special.

As the events of September 11 stay with us day after day, we realize how really unimportant sports are, and then we realize how important, in a much different way, they are.

Of all the people involved in sports, I consider us the most fortunate. We are not in entertainment; we are in education-based activities at its purest level. We are not about getting kids scholarships for the next level (less than 2 percent achieve that goal). We are an end in itself. Athletics, at our level, is a part of the total educational process. We, who are a part of it, are indeed fortunate. Robert Hastings was correct - it really is about the journey and, man, what a journey.



Education Is the Key to Athletics

“Recognizing that the primary objective of all secondary schools is to educate youth, the TSSAA aims to coordinate the athletic and scholastic program. The athletic field and the gymnasium are classrooms in which teaching is foremost in the development of character, integrity, sportsmanship, and teamwork. Although the athletic program is associated primarily with physical education and the scholastic program with mental education, one complements the other.”

Sound familiar? It should. The quote is taken from Article I of the TSSAA Constitution.

“Education is the key to athletics!” TSSAA exists to complement and enhance education. It’s the physical half of education. It goes beyond the physical aspect into the mental well-being of children to work with others, get along with others, participate with others, to understand leadership both as a leader and a follower, and most importantly, to be a part of the entire school program. TSSAA has been a leader in setting standards for education to be able to participate in athletics in the school system.

To participate in high school athletics and the TSSAA, the school secures protection for its students, itself, and its community. It provides equal opportunity to compete in athletics on equal terms and under the same rules and regulations with proper enforcement. A school secures the chance for its students to be social and secure the benefits of social living, as well as achieving standards and criteria to measure what is and what ought to be in athletics. To participate, a student and a school gain satisfaction in belonging to something with high and worthy ideals

and practices. Participating in organized TSSAA sports provides a school with all the privileges of participating in an athletic association that is truly representative of a democracy. Schools can make the rules and schools can change the rules!

Standards, uniformity, and consistency are the keys to interscholastic programs that truly support education.

TSSAA works hard to prevent exploitation of high school students by special interest athletic programs in the United States and, also, from overzealous fans and parents who somewhere along the line have forgotten that children are in school for education first and athletics second.

One of the greatest joys of being a part of TSSAA for the last 35 years is working with people like Ronnie Carter, Gene Beck, Gene Menees, and Bernard Childress who understand that education in our schools is the key to an adult life for all children and that it comes first. These guys understand that athletics is truly one of the greatest things that could happen in a child’s life, but it also has a place in life behind education. I don’t believe I have ever known four guys that believe in God, country, family, and education any stronger than these guys. They strive hard to help keep programs in line and standards uniform across the state of Tennessee. Their love of family is the same love they bring forward in working with TSSAA. Commitment and loyalty to any program is the key to the success of any program, tempered with caring and loving concern for what’s right. Thus, the statement, “Just Do What’s Right!”

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE RECOGNITION

ADMINISTRATOR – TERRY GLOVER



TSSAA is proud to honor Terry Glover, Athletic Director at Dyersburg High School, Dyersburg, Tennessee, as its administrator of the quarter. Terry was educated in Mayfield, Kentucky and graduated in 1959. He attended Murray State College and received his Bachelor of Science degree in 1963 and went on to complete his Masters Degree from Memphis State University in 1968.

Upon graduation from Murray State, he joined the Dyersburg City School System and has been a teacher, coach, assistant principal, and vocational director. Terry has coached football and girls basketball, and in 1970 he was named Assistant Principal at Dyersburg High School. Along with administrative responsibility came athletics, but it was a few years later that he was given the title of Athletic Director. As Athletic Director, he oversees 17 varsity and freshmen teams and under his leadership has expanded from three varsity sports to the present 17 varsity and freshmen teams. He has hosted and directed numerous football playoffs, basketball tournaments, as well as baseball, softball, volleyball, track, and soccer, meets.

Terry is a member of the Dyersburg Education Association, where he has served as President, Tennessee Education Association, and National Education Association. He has been a member of the Tennessee Vocational Education, as well as the Tennessee Coaches Association. He has served as Vice President, President, and has served on the Board for many years of the Tennessee High School Athletic Administrators Association. He has served as coordinator for TSSAA, as well as serving on many local boards and youth groups. He is a member of the First Baptist Church of Dyersburg, where he also serves on many committees. He and his wife Donna have three children and six grandchildren. He was named Athletic Director of the Year in 1993 by the THSAAA. In 1970, he received the NIAAA State Award of Merit, the A. F. Bridges Sportsmanship Award in 1998-99 as Athletic Director of the Year for District 8, TSSAA Award of Excellence for Exemplary Display of Sportsmanship, Ethics and Integrity in 1998-99, and in the spring of 2001 he became a Certified Athletic Administrator sanctioned by the NIAAA.

COACH – SAMUEL “DICK” HENDLEY

Dick attended Gallaudet University in Washington, D.C. where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology. He later received his Master's degree in Special Education from the University of Tennessee.

Dick taught one year at South Dakota School for the Deaf in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. In 1976, he began his teaching career at TSD. He became the sixth TSD/Gallaudet University alumnus to become head football coach at TSD in 1987. His teams have earned such honors as: 1987 Deaf Prep 5th Place Team, 1988 National Deaf Prep 4th Place Team, 1989 National Deaf Prep 6th Place Team. Along with football, he has coached girls and boys track at TSD.

In 1996, the Senior class dedicated the TSD Viking Yearbook to Dick Hendley. He has served as president of TSD's local education association and currently serves on the math curriculum committee.

WHISTLE NOTES

Officials registered in soccer, football, wrestling, baseball, and softball will receive a copy of the NFHS Preseason Guide in their particular sport this school year. The National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) and Referee Enterprises, Inc. (REI), publishers of Referee Magazine, will produce the Preseason Guides. This publication will have a review of the rule changes in each sport. Additionally, there will be information on other areas of sports rules and mechanics. Hopefully, this will be a resource that will supplement the educational opportunities for officials. With the review of the rule changes in the NFHS Sports Rules Book and the review of the Case Book situations, this preseason guide can provide additional discussion of the specific rule changes. Officials that register in these sports will receive, through the local association, the preseason guides prior to each sports season. TSSAA has chosen to customize the last two pages with general information to the sports official, as well as sports specific information for each official. This will give an opportunity to provide, in a concise way, needed administrative information in a written form. This will help save time during the state rules meetings and will allow this information to be in a form that can be saved as a valuable resource.

OFFICIALS FEES

Game fees have been set for regular season varsity contests in volleyball, soccer, football, wrestling, basketball, baseball, and softball. The fees have been set by the TSSAA Board of Control for the 2001-02, 2002-03, and the 2003-04 school years. These fees are for varsity regular season contests only. The fees for officials that are working j.v. or b-team, freshman, and/or middle school games are determined by member schools and the local association.

STATE RULES MEETING CREDIT

Remember that effective with this year, the Closed Book Exam will no longer count as credit for a state rules meeting. The Closed Book Exam must be taken and passed for an official to be eligible to work post-season assignments. An official must attend at least one state sponsored rules meeting and five local interpreters meetings in football and basketball. They must attend one state sponsored rules meeting and three local interpreters meetings in volleyball, soccer, baseball, softball, and wrestling.

THE OFFICIAL GAME BALL FOR TSSAA STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

As a reminder, ball contracts are in effect for the 2001-02, 2002-03, and 2003-04 school years. The TSSAA will continue with

Rawlings in football, basketball, and baseball. In the basketball tournament the composite ball will be used. The girl's ball will be the EDG3WC285 and the boy's ball will be the EDG3WC. The football will be the ST5 and the baseball will be the raised-seam ball. Worth will continue to furnish softballs for the state tournament. Tachikara will furnish the state volleyballs and the ball provided will be the SVSWH. Brine will furnish the NCAA Championship game balls (BC105) for the girls' and boys' state soccer championships.

Ronnie Carter has been elected president of the National Federation of State High School Association (NFHS) for 2001-02. He becomes the 42nd president of the NFHS.

Election of the NFHS officers took place by the NFHS Board of Directors at its July meeting during the 82nd annual Summer Meeting of the NFHS. The NFHS Board of Directors consists of 12 members: one representative from each of the eight geographical sections of the NFHS plus four at-large members. The National Council elects each member for a four-year term.

Carter has been with the TSSAA since 1978 and has been executive director since 1986. Before joining the TSSAA, he spent 11 years teaching high school mathematics and coaching football, basketball, wrestling, and track. Carter has also used officiating experience gained along the way to train other officials.

At the national level, Carter is in his fourth year of a four-year term as a member of the NFHS Board of Directors, representing Section 3 which includes Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Louisiana, and Tennessee. He is only the second representative from Tennessee to be on the

NFHS Board of Directors. Gill Gideon, the second executive director of the TSSAA, was President of the NFHS during the 1981-82 school year.

“It’s a great honor personally, but I also think it’s a great honor for our state,” noted Carter.

As President, Carter will be responsible for presiding over National Federation board meetings. The NFHS board meets four times a year. Other duties include being in attendance at national meetings, six section meetings that are held throughout the country this fall, and representing the National Federation at NCAA meetings.

Mr. Carter added, “I’m looking forward to new friendships and coming into contact with people that you would not have come into contact with were it not for this opportunity. I think one of the greatest benefits of education is the friendships and relationships that are made.” He has been a member of the NFHS rules committees for basketball and football, serving as chairman of the basketball committee for eight years and chairman of football research subcommittee for eight years. He currently is a member of the NFHS Wrestling Rules Committee.

Heat Related Injuries

Prevention and Conditions

As the temperatures and humidity rise, the fittest to the poorest condition athlete are at the same risk for heat related problems. Prevention of debilitating condition can be as easy as..

- **A good preseason screening**
- **Good health history**
- **Frequent breaks**
- **Pre and post hydration**
- **Proper sport attire**
- **Constant monitoring of athletes**
- **Environmental conditions**

Pre-practice or event fluid intake should be heavy amounts of water until the urine is pale yellow in color. Bright yellow urine is a sign of not enough fluid intake. Drinks with caffeine are not recommended as they only encourage urination depleting the body of the necessary water content. The three types of heat related illness is heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Any of these conditions can occur alone or progress to another heat related illness.

Heat cramps are muscle pains or spasms that occur usually in the abdominal, arms, legs or back. This condition occurs when the body becomes dehydrated. Muscle cramps can start as stiffness or soreness so be aware of the early onset as cramping only becomes more severe over time. The best way to treat the athlete is to stop all activity, place athlete in a cool environment, and give plenty of fluids. Water is the preferred drink. If these conditions last for more than 1 hour, seek medical attention.

Heat exhaustion is a medical condition that occurs when the athlete becomes dehydrated and begins to sweat, excessively losing water and salt. The body keeps

sweating because the sweat is not evaporated from the body cooling the core temperature. This condition occurs more frequently in high humidity areas. The signs and symptoms are paleness, tiredness, weakness, dizziness, headache, nausea or vomiting, fainting, cool moist skin, fast weak pulse, and fast shallow breathing. If heat exhaustion symptoms occur, placing the athlete in a cool environment such as a cool shower, ice towels, lightweight clothing, and encouraging the athlete to drink water are the recommended treatment. If condition worsens, seek advanced medical treatment.

Heat stroke is a medical emergency. This condition occurs when the body stops sweating and the body's core temperature can rise to dangerous levels. In as little as 10-15 minutes the body can reach temperatures as high as 106 degrees. The signs and symptoms are high body temperature; red, dry, hot skin (no sweating); rapid strong pulse, headache, dizziness, nausea, confusion and unconsciousness. Death can occur if advanced medical treatment is not sought. Treatment is...

- Call 911
- Place athlete in a cool area
- Use ice towels to cool body
- Give water if the athlete has the ability to drink

Do not place the athlete in a tub of ice water....why? If he/she loses consciousness, they could drown.

Prevention can be as easy as proper hydration before and after the event or practice. Monitor the temperature and humidity of the environment, and when necessary adjust and move practices and games to safer times of the day. With a little advanced care athletes will be able to perform at their highest level.

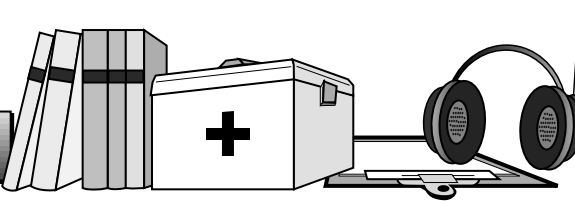
